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RESPECT AWARD

The Respect Award is based on a student demonstrating the characteristics of our school motto; *courtesy, consideration and cooperation*, and the value of *respect*. The Award recognises those students who show consistent regard for others and the environment, who are attentive, polite and thoughtful when interacting with staff and peers, and who engage with purpose and intent in all aspects of school life.

The Respect Badge is awarded to one student, per class, per semester and students may earn one badge per phase of learning (Y1-2, Y3-4, Y5-6). Different badges are used to reflect each phase. Students can receive up to three Respect Awards during their time at Floreat Park P.S when they attend from Yr1-6.

Teachers decide how to identify each recipient. This may be through observation, class voting, peer reporting, and staff and community feedback.

The Respect Badge is the highest award a student can receive in recognition of attitude and behaviour at our school. Recipients can be very proud of the acknowledgement and are encouraged to wear their Badge each day to reflect their positive contribution to our school community and to inspire others.

In groups we set up our own stalls, where all the items cost no more than a few dollars and we became sellers and buvers.

As sellers we learned about customer service, shop displays, floats, stock keeping, profit and loss. We practised calculating correct change and totaling small amounts of notes and coins. As buyers we visited stalls, used our manners, recorded our purchases and counted our change to make sure it was correct. We recorded our spending and kept to a budget. After two sessions we calculated each stalls profit. Our most successful stall made a profit of \$97.35, our least successful stall made only \$17.40 profit.

Why? The class agreed that the choice of product made the difference. Our most successful stall had a very good supply of Beanie Boos, customers could not get enough!


Well done for your community spirit.
