Introduction

Your school is getting a new warranted children's crossing that will be operated by a trained Traffic Warden. A children's crossing is designed to contribute to the safe travel of students to and from school and its proper use is vital to achieving the safety benefits for the children and any accompanying adults. In addition, the correct and proper use of a children's crossing by children will assist them in learning how to cross roads safely.

Here are some suggestions on how to inform your school community about your new children's crossing.

What you can do

- Inform students of the new children's crossing and how to use it at a school assembly.
- Inform teachers of the new children's crossing at a staff meeting or by any other relevant internal school communication.
- Publish an article in your school newsletter, on bulletin boards around the school or on your school's Facebook page:
 - Advising of the new children's crossing
 - Asking that the Traffic Warden's instructions be obeyed.
 - Asking parents to drive safely around the crossing.
 - Advising of any new parking requirements or restrictions around the children's crossing
- 4. Take students to the new crossing location for orientation – especially younger students. Not only will they learn where to cross the road safely, but they can also be introduced to your Traffic Warden and will know that he/she is someone to listen to, trust and respect.

Other initiatives

Other initiatives your school can undertake for the proper and safe use of the children's crossing are to:

- Develop internal instructions or guidelines regarding the correct use of the children's crossing.
- Monitor the behaviour of students using the children's crossing for the first few weeks to ensure that they (and their parents) are using it effectively and are following the directions of the Traffic Warden.
- Take appropriate remedial action for the incorrect use of the children's crossing by students (or parents).
- Develop feedback mechanisms for teachers, students and parents for the incorrect use of the crossing.

Great Cocky Count

The Great Cocky Count is a long-term citizen science survey and the biggest single survey for black-cockatoos in Western Australia. On one night in autumn, volunteers monitor known roost sites and count black-cockatoos as they come in to their evening roosts. Records submitted from across the southwest provide a snapshot of black-cockatoo populations, and over time this has helped us quantify the changes in black-cockatoo numbers.

The Great Cocky Count originally started as a survey method for Carnaby's Black-Cockatoos, and focussed just on the roost sites around the Perth Metropolitan area, but over recent years has expanded to include Forest Red-tailed Cockatoos as well as sites across the southwest. 2018 will be the tenth Great Cocky Count. Previous Great Cocky Count reports can be found on the <u>Publications and Forms</u> page. See the FAQ sheet below for more information.

A key aim of the GCC is to survey as many roost sites as possible. We need your help to make the 2018 GCC the most comprehensive survey yet. The GCC will be on Sunday April 8 2018 at sunset (approximately 5.30-6.30pm in Perth).

WHAT YOU CAN DO?

1. Report a roost site

Help us to identify more roost sites for both white-tailed and red-tailed black-cockatoos! Roosts are places where black-cockatoos rest at night. Important information on the location of critical roosting habitat is collected through the Great Cocky Count, and is increasing each year. If you know about a night-time roost site, please email or call us about it.

2. Register to monitor a roost site for the 2018 Great Cocky Count

Unfortunately the Great Cocky Count registrations have closed. We hope to see you in 2019!

We use a number of methods to communicate with parents to help let you know what is happening in the school and with your children:


